Open Enrollment

The application period for the 2022-23 school year is February 7 - April 29, 2022. Wisconsin's inter-district public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend a school other than the one in which they live. Parents must complete an online application no earlier than February 7, 2022, and no later than April 29, 2022 by 4:00 p.m. The DPI website to complete an online application is: <u>https://dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment</u>

Insect Stings

Spring is (hopefully) here and so is the possibility of insect stings! It may be hard to avoid them completely, but it's important to know what you should do if your child has an allergic reaction from an insect sting.

Insect stings that most commonly cause allergic reactions are:

- Honey Bees
- Paper Wasps
- Hornets
- Yellow Jackets
- Fire Ants

How do I recognize an allergic reaction?

Not everyone is allergic to insect stings. For most children who are stung, the normal reaction is short-lived, with redness and swelling at the site of the sting, followed by pain and itching. Usually the reaction lasts only a few hours. For others, however, allergic reactions to these insect stings can be *life threatening*. The reaction is called anaphylaxis, or anaphylactic shock, is a medical emergency and can include severe symptoms such as:

- Swelling of the face, throat or tongue
- DIfficulty breathing
- Dizziness
- Stomach cramps
- Nausea or diarrhea
- Itchiness and hives over large areas of the body

*Immediate medical attention is required

How can we avoid insect stings?

Avoidance of insects is the best preventative Suggestions for helping your child avoid insect stings include:

- If you spot stinging insects, remain calm and quiet, and slowly move away.
- Avoid brightly colored clothing and perfume when outdoors. Many stinging insects are searching for food and could confuse you with a flower.
- Be careful outdoors when cooking, eating or drinking sweet beverages like soda or juice. Cover food and drinks to keep insects out.
- Wear closed-toe shoes outdoors and avoid going barefoot to steer clear of stepping on a stinging insect.
- Avoid loose-fitting garments that can trap insects between material and skin.
